

Thanks, Elma Stockman Mr. X wrote to the Presbytery Clerk, saying how pleased he had been with the funeral service. To give him his due, Duncan Shaw came round and showed Robert the letter. However, at the next meeting of the Presbytery, then the item 'Correspondence' came up, there was no mention of this letter. When Robert raised this, Duncan said "I regarded it as a private letter".

I will finish with a few words from the Bible, directed at Robert. These will be echoed by everyone here, by all those whom he has visited during illness and bereavement to give them comfort and hope, by Rev. Dr. Dick Anderson who really appreciates the work that Robert did to get him accredited as a Minister in the Church of Scotland, and also by those in our partner Church in Kenya, where Robert spent time, and who are still benefitting from his work to this day. These words, found in Matthew, Chapter 25, verse 21, are "Well done, good and faithful servant".

To Robert

As Robert recalls in March's Tally Lamp, his first impression of the Church was that it was closed. If you remember, it did look a bit derelict, with a large crack down the roughcast at the front. Thanksfully, he rose to the challenge.

It wasn't easy, or quick, but he persevered and brought the Congregation together. With his encouragement, and fundraising, the roughcast was renewed. The Church was reroofed, and following Presbytery's instruction, the slates and cast-iron guttering were replaced, like for like. The tiles and plastic guttering looked like the original. The inside of the Church has completely changed, as has the landscape between the Church and the back fence. Not only has the physical side of the Church been improved; but we now have a Girl's Brigade, a resurrected Boy's Brigade, Stepping Stones and the Summer Holiday Club. In the last 20 years, a large number of young people will have passed through this building.

We must not forget the work Robert did in schools as their Chaplain. This means that a large number of young people in the local area will have received the Christian message. The most memorable services in the Church included Robert's wedding to Christine, and our Centenary Celebration nearly 10 years ago. The then Moderator of the Church of Scotland, Rev. David Lunan, took part in the service and at the photo-call afterwards, revealed that he knew Robert. He put his arm around Robert's shoulder, pointed to him and said "Robert is my friend" – not the normal behaviour of Moderators.

Robert was also on the Committee at 121 which appointed Moderators. I don't think all of Robert's choices became

Moderators. I accompanied Robert to General Assemblies (one about every 4 years), and meetings of Presbytery (9 per year). Some were LESS eventful than others! The last Presbytery Report revealed that 4 members of this Congregation had shown an interest in becoming a Minister, a figure that left many Presbyters gob-smacked. The last time someone from Blackburn had applied to become a Minister; he was rejected by Presbytery at the first hurdle. He is now the Chief Executive of West Lothian Council (and a Celtic FC season-ticket holder). I have a story from Presbytery, a few years ago, a Mr. X had attended a funeral in the Presbytery, and complained to the Presbytery Clerk about the service. Mr. X was not satisfied with the response, and a major row developed over many months (years even?) wasting hours of time at each meeting. Presbytery blocked Mr. X's emails, and referred him to 121.

One day Robert phoned me saying that a relative of Mr. X had died in the parish. The funeral had been arranged in this Church, and Robert wondered if Jean and I could go to "keep an eye" on things.

When the family took their seats, I looked for someone fitting the description I had built up at Presbytery. There was no-one with a black mask, black coat, forked tail and a trident! As usual, the service went very well and I phoned Robert that evening to find out how things had gone. He had met Mr. X, and got on well with him.
